TV equipment. The service costs Glasgow Corporation about £100,000 a year and all new schools are equipped to receive when they are being built.

The service in Glasgow is available to 10,000 maths pupils and about 25,000 primary school French - language pupils every day. The next stage in that city is to introduce sixth-form science, social studies and hygiene programmes for infants.

The city is short of about 1,300 teachers.

NOVEL IDEA

While Hull's shortage is nearly so severe as that in Glasgow, the position would be greatly relieved by the provision of teaching programmes on the closed-circuit television.

Commented a teacher in a Hull primary school, "It is certainly a novel idea, but I would want to see it working really well before I gave it my unqualified support."
